The initiative is an action research partnership project between YFS Ltd and security experts Concentric Concepts to develop, trial and evaluate responses to technology-facilitated abuse.

Project RITA ran from January 2024 to December 2024.

Background

Domestic and family violence victim-survivors and services are grappling with escalating levels of technology-facilitated abuse, including financial abuse, stalking and coercive control. The impact of this type of abuse on victim-survivors can be significant and long-lasting. Yet many in the domestic and family violence sector feel ill-equipped to respond and find it challenging to keep up with the ever-changing landscape of technologies that are being used to abuse, control, stalk and harass.

Project activities

Project RITA supported 90 victim-survivors and 133 sector workers through the following activities:

- 42 women attended one of seven community hub sessions, where 71 personal devices were checked for threats which could compromise their safety
- 30 women benefited from technology sweeps, where their vehicles or homes were checked for threats such as tracking devices, listening devices and cameras
- 20 women benefited from in-home residential vulnerability assessments
- 26 women benefited home security upgrades, including installation of security cameras, sensors lights, screen doors and changed locks
- 30 women received specialised, wrap-around support, which included on-going risk assessment and safety planning
- 133 sector stakeholders attended one of eight capacitybuilding sessions providing practical tools to identify and respond effectively to technology-facilitated abuse


Key outcomes

For people impacted by technology-facilitated abuse:

- 89% had better knowledge and awareness of technologyfacilitated abuse
- 86% had a better understanding of how to use technology for their safety and wellbeing
- **95% felt somewhat or very safe** at the end of service
- 79% improved their financial stability

For sector workers:

- 97% felt they had a better understanding of technologyfacilitated abuse
- **95%** felt confident to **identify** technology-facilitated abuse
- 93% felt confident to respond and safety plan around technology-facilitated abuse
- 77% felt confident in their practice supporting children experiencing technology-facilitated abuse



Key learnings

Project RITA highlighted:

- There are gaps and missed opportunities in the service system in responding to technology-facilitated abuse. Ineffective screening and assessment leads to ineffective safety planning and actions that can inadvertently increase the risk of harm and put more pressure on already stretched resources.
- Integrated responses are effective. Identifying and responding to technology-facilitated abuse requires the dual expertise of a specialist domestic and family violence lens and a specialist technology-based security lens for comprehensive and effective risk assessment, safety planning and responses.

Recommendations

Opportunities to continue to improve responses to technology-facilitated abuse include:

- 1 More sector education and training
- 2 Establishment of referral pathways for specialist advice and support
- 3 Embedding RITA team in High Risk Teams across Queensland
- 4 A targeted regional pilot focused on every victim-survivor entering emergency accommodation and/or refuge to minimise tracking risks, reduce pressure on already stretched resources to relocate women multiple times and improve system efficiencies
- 5 Investment in holistic, individualised support for victimsurvivors experiencing technology-facilitated abuse and co-occurring forms of violence
- 6 Further research on practical strategies to interrupt technology-facilitated abuse without causing unintended safety consequences

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
